Joshua Bell, Indiana Jones to highlight Arts Boca fest

Herb Alpert, Laila Lalami and Joey Alexander also to appear

The Festival of the Arts Boca on Monday named its 2016 bill of authors, dancers and musicians, a lineup anchored with performances by violinist Joshua Bell, jazz trumpeter Herb Alpert and the circus act Cirque de la Symphonie.

Tickets are on sale now for the 10th annual showcase of top-tier thinkers and creatives, with prices ranging from \$15 to \$225 per event via FestivalBoca.com.

Bell, a name familiar to visitors of the Kravis and Adrienne Arsht centers, performs with a 302-year-old Stradivarius violin and has played in rarified company: President Barack Obama, British royalty and the cast of "Sesame Street." His March 16 role, on the festival's closing night, is as a soloist and conductor in a performance of Vivaldi's "The Four Seasons" with Lynn University's Philharmonia at Mizner Park Amphitheater.

The festival kicks off 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 4, with a screening of Steven Spielberg's epic "Raiders of the Lost Ark," (\$15-\$125, Mizner Park Amphitheater) the first in the Indiana Jones saga, with its rousing John Williams score performed live by the University of Miami's Henry Mancini Institute Orchestra. Alpert follows at 7 p.m. March 6 (\$15-\$75, Amphitheater) in a duet with his wife, Grammy-winning singer Lani Hall.

Pulitzer Prize finalist Laila Lalami heads to the Mizner Park Cultural Arts Center (201 Plaza Real, second floor) 4 p.m. March 9 (\$25-\$40) to discuss her novel "The Moor's Account," recounting the 16th century voyage of Castilian conquistador Pánfilo de Narváez and his 600-man crew to Florida's Gulf Coast.

On March 11, 12-year-old jazz piano prodigy Joey Alexander will tickle the ivories with his trio at 7:30 p.m. at Mizner Park Amphitheater (\$15-\$100). Alexander has been on a tear since 2014, after gaining the spotlight with a standout show at Jazz at Lincoln Center, and with a critically praised debut album, "My Favorite Things," released in May.

Cirque de la Symphonie then performs 7:30 p.m. March 12 (\$15-\$100, Mizner Park Amphitheater), an evening of Russian circus-style performances scored to music by the Symphonia Boca Raton and conductor Constantine Kitsopoulos.

Festival of the Arts Boca will return March 4-16 at Mizner Park Amphitheater, 590 Plaza Real, and Mizner Park Cultural Arts Center, 201 Plaza Real, in Boca Raton. Tickets cost \$15-\$225. Call 866-571-2787 or go to FestivalBoca.com.

One + one = 42 Truths

Tap 42 and Funky Buddha Brewery collaborate on a new craft beer

The coupling of Tap 42 and Funky Buddha Brewery has filled local barflies and beer cognoscenti with anticipation over its potential spawn not unlike the buzz of first hearing Brad Pitt and Angelia Jolie were together.

Now, you can taste it, as their collaboration craft beer, called 42 Truths Florida Pale Ale, will have its official release at parties Tuesday at Tap 42 Fort Lauderdale and Thursday at Tap 42 in Boca Raton. After the release, the beer also will be available at the Funky Buddha in Oakland Park.

This is the first beer to fly the flag of Tap 42, the popular tavern that is about to open its next location, in Coral Gables, in January-February. Funky Buddha's beer has had a prominent place on the wall of taps at Tap 42, and the Floridian has been a staple of its Sunday brunch menu.

"They approached us about doing this, and it was just a perfect fit. To us, they're really the best in the business," says Alex Rudolph, Tap 42's vice presi-

dent of operations. 42 Truths is a 5.55 ABV classic American pale ale with a hint of orange as a nod to Florida, Rudolph says.

"They're the brewers and we left it up to them, but we gave them the direction we wanted," he says. "It's an easy, drinkable beer. Very approachable, for the masses, but complex enough so that the craft beer nerds will still appreciate it. I think they really nailed it."

The name also walked a fine line: recognizable as something affiliated with the bar, but not too obvious. After kicking around ideas with the number 42 in them, the Tap team settled on a wink at "A Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy," in which the Deep Thought supercomputer reveals that "the answer to the ultimate question of life, the universe and everything, is 42."

And you thought the answer to everything was Angelina Jolie.

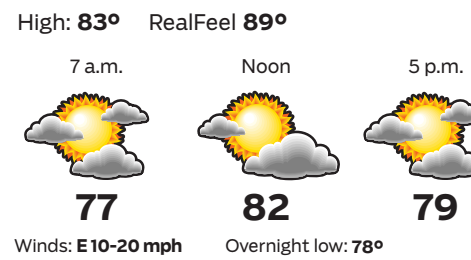

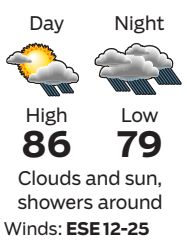

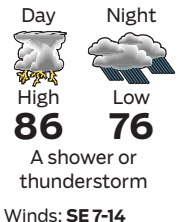
A stalled front over South Florida will pull northward on Tuesday. As a result, humidity will increase. Expect clouds & sun with breezy east winds and a few passing showers.

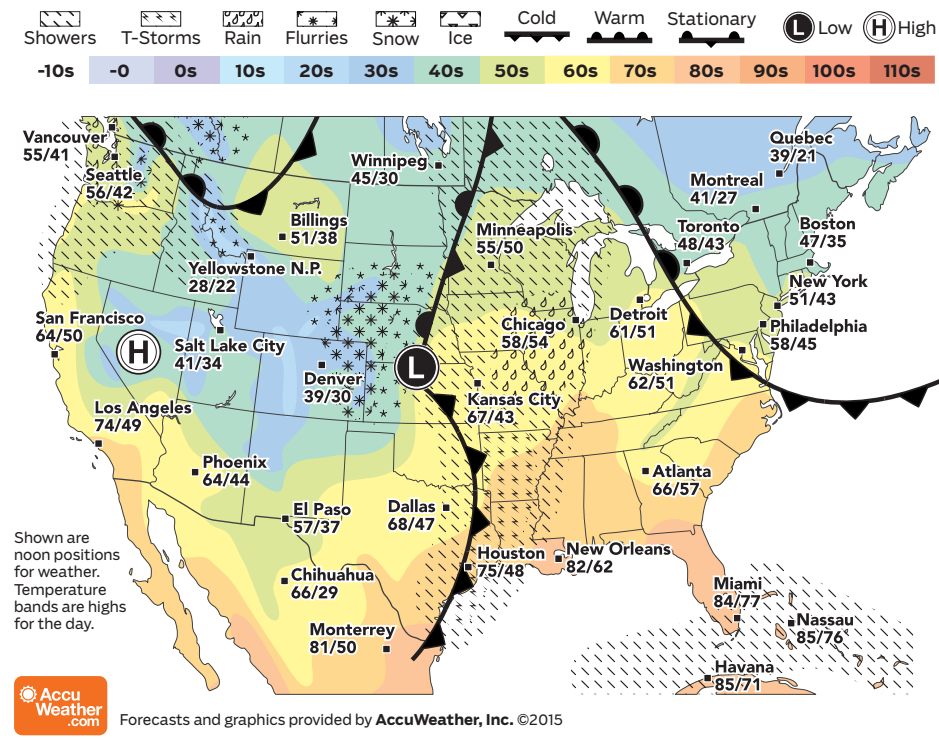
