Where to peruse recycled art, pick up litter, honor the planet in South Florida

he first Earth Day – on April 22, 1970 – began as a movement among organizations, faith groups, college students and others throughout the United States to protest the effects of 150 years of industrial development on humans and the environment.

Since Earth Day went global in 1990, millions of people have used the holiday to bring awareness to environmental issues, including clean energy and recycling efforts, according to Earth-Day.org.

Here in South Florida, cities are planning to celebrate the planet this month through events that educate residents, clean up neighborhoods and beaches, and use art to make a visual statement about the environment's impact on our lives.

The Seminole Tribe of Florida's Okalee Indian Village in Hollywood celebrated Earth Day early, on April 18, with Barry Big Mountain and the Iron Horse Dancers performing American Indian songs and dances, along with Seminole Native musical performances by Rez Jamz. Tribal crafts and food vendors, workshops and environmental presentations also were part of the daylong event.

Coming up in Palm Beach County, the power of water and our


